The sign-in sheets of those in attendance are attached to the minutes.

SETD staff included Chad Reese, RPO Coordinator, and assisting with the meeting were Chuck Hammonds, Ashley Gates, and Garrett Haynes. SETD Executive Director, Beth Jones, was also in attendance as a member of the Technical Committee.

Welcome and Roll Calls

Executive Committee Chairman, Bill James, welcomed those present and called the meeting of the Executive Board and Technical Committee to order at 10:35 a.m. RPO Coordinator, Chad Reese, acknowledged and welcomed new members recently selected by the Southeast Tennessee Development District Executive Board to fill various vacancies on the Technical Committee: Shannon Burke (Bike/Ped representative from Velo View Bike Tours), Jake Battles (Freight representative from Covenant Transport), and those not present, Kristy Cox (Aviation representative from Athens Air), Byron Clinton (Rail representative from Iron Horse rail line in Marion County), and Greg Raider (Waterway representative from the Nickajack Port Authority). Members were asked to go around the room to quickly introduce themselves. Mr. Reese then announced that a quorum was present.

Election of Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Technical Committee

Executive Committee Chairman James, called on Chad Reese to present nominations to fill vacancies for the position of Chair and Vice-Chair of the Technical Committee. Mr. Reese gave special thanks and recognition to Wanda Fulmer, previous Chairwoman, who had recently retired from the Mark Anton Airport in Dayton and had resigned from the committee a few months prior as our aviation representative. Mr. Reese then presented nominations for the Chair and Vice-Chair selected from the east and west side of the RPO region. Mr. Reese has spoken with both gentlemen who had agreed to serve, which were McMinn County Highway Superintendent, Dan Evans, for Chairman, and Bledsoe County Highway Superintendent, Robby Roberson, for Vice-Chairman. Chairman James then called for any other nominations. There being none, Chairman James called for a motion to accept these two gentlemen for the positions as nominated. Marion County Mayor, David Jackson, made a motion to accept the nominations, which was seconded by Sequatchie County Executive, Keith Cartwright. The motioned carried unanimously, and Mr. Evans was called to the front to Chair the remainder of the meeting of the Technical Committee.

Executive & Technical Committee Minutes

On a motion made by Sequatchie County Executive, Keith Cartwright, seconded by Bledsoe County Mayor, Gregg Ridley, the Executive Board minutes from the joint meeting of the Executive Board and Technical Committee held December 5, 2018, were unanimously approved as presented.

On a motion made by SETD Executive Director, Beth Jones, seconded by Athens Public Works Director, Ben Burchfield, the Technical Committee minutes from the joint meeting of the Executive Board and Technical Committee held December 5, 2018, were unanimously approved.

Southeast RPO Updates & Projects

Mr. Reese gave a presentation to the RPO that was originally prepared to be given to TDOT Commissioner, Clay Bright, but later Assistant Commissioner, Toks Omishakin, at the RPO Conference in Sewanee back September. The presentation highlighted various modes of transportation across the region but also demonstrated how diverse modes of transportation can exist within close proximity along the same route such as; the Appalachian Regional Inland port in Crandall, GA just 6.5 miles south of the TN-GA line on Highway 411, horse drawn buggies using Highway 411 in Delano, TN, and historic downtown Etowah along Highway 411 with sidewalks, local shops, and tourist attractions. Mr. Reese said the Southeast TN Development District's region consisted of 10 counties and 40 cities which encompasses more than 640,000 people. The 9-coutny RPO region had a combined population of nearly 243,000 people and included 2 economically distressed counties (Bledsoe and Grundy), and 2 at-risk counties (Meigs and Rhea).

The various programs of the Development District were highlighted under each of the agency's 3 main divisions: setcares, setworks, and setbuilds. Mr. Reese went on to say that parts of our region have seen tremendous growth in recent years with the expansion of existing industry and the location of new companies who now call our region home. In the last 3 years we have seen the announcements of 4 major companies who have invested more than \$380 million and have created more than 825 jobs, not to mention all of the suppliers, contractors, construction workers, and others who have helped to construct these new facilities. Also, in the last 3 years we have seen the expansion of 11 major employers, who combined, have invested an additional \$1.57 billion in our region and have created an additional 2,089 full-time jobs. The numbers provided were from September 2019, which did not include recent announcements like Mueller Water Products in Kimball and others.

Major projects undertaken by the RPO in the last year were highlighted including: the writing and administering of numerous transportation-related grants that were listed on the screen, assisting 4 local governments with writing ADA Transition Plans (with 3 more to go), participating in FHWA's National Economic Partnership grant that was awarded to TDOT to study freight movements and overnight truck parking in the Southeast TN Region, participation on the Thrive 2055 Freight Mobility Committee, and serving on the technical committees of the Chattanooga-Hamilton County-N. Georgia TPO and the Cleveland MPO. Mr. Reese said there are many other great projects our RPO is working on and planning for the coming year.

Mr. Reese also highlighted the \$2.2 Million State Industrial Access road project on Summer City Road in Bledsoe County serving Southern Valley and 8 other farms. Southern Valley is the largest produce growing operation in the State of Tennessee supplying a wide-range of produce to Wal-Mart, Aldi, Blue Apron, and Darden Restaurant group across the southeast region of the U.S. Their capital investment is estimated to be over \$13 million, and their operation has continued to grow by 30-40% since 2010. They recently completed a 76,500 square foot warehouse and packaging facility to keep up with demand. Each year, Southern Valley hires more than 650 migrant workers to harvest their crops and sort and package vegetables. Southern Valley provides, housing, meals, and even day-care for the children of their laborers. With such continued success, Southern Valley is even looking into operating with full-employment year-round. However, like any rural farm, access to their fields and operations is usually limited to narrow back-county roads and those located far from major highways. With an operation as large as the Southern Valley's, moving more than 40 tractor trailer loads a day along with farming equipment, busing laborers, and moving produce from the fields to the packaging warehouses puts a lot of traffic and wear and tear on their local roads. As is the case with most of our roadways, age and use has taken its toll. When Bledsoe County Highway Superintendent, Robby Roberson, reached out to the Southeast TN Development District for help in finding money to repave approximately 5 miles of Summer City Road serving this farm and 8 others, we took a long shot and asked TDOT for help under the State Industrial Access Road program. In fact, we had reached out to ECD, ARC, and AGEnterpirse with TDOT being the only one to respond favorably. After a site visit from Danielle Hagewood and her team, it was not long until we had a set of plans for repaving this roadway, and new plans for constructing a turn lane onto Summer City Road from Highway 30. Mr. Reese thanked TDOT for coming through with a more than \$2.2 million SIA project that will greatly improve access to these 8 farms. Mr. Reese said industry does not always come in the form of a manufacturer, and that this type of innovative approach and thinking outside the box allowed us to use funds from an existing TDOT program to fund this much needed project and further protect the future of these farming operations in a distressed rural county.

Mr. Reese concluded by offering suggestions for the RPO as we look to the future. 1.) The top priority is providing assistance to local highway departments in the form of increased State Aid funding, and training on new cost-saving methods of paving to stretch local highway funds. Mr. Reese also said that providing RPO's funding and the ability to program transportation projects in much the same way MPO's do would also enhance the region's ability to meet transportation needs. 2.) The future effects of the Appalachian Regional Port in Crandall, GA along Highway 411 was going to have to be closely monitored for future increases in truck traffic delivering and receiving freight from the port. 3.) Improving travel time and reducing congestion of motorists and truck freight passing through Chattanooga on I-75 and I-24 was another major priority of the MPO, TPO, and RPO. 4.) The completion of the Corridor K project along U.S. 64 through the Ocoee River Gorge is a major priority for the RPO. 5.) Finally, Mr. Reese said, while we may dream big about 4-lane highways, new river bridges, and bypasses, it should not be underestimated how much of an impact the smaller projects can have on a community such as; adding a turn lane into a school or putting up new overhead school zone lights (like recent projects in Grundy and McMinn), grading a hill to make visibility better for drivers, or improving safety for local motorists by adding new signage, guardrails, lane striping, and more reflectors to see better at night and in the fog on our rural, unlit roads. These types of projects can have a big impact on a community, can be accomplished fairly quickly at a reasonable cost, and can often improve these routes without an immediate need to widen the road or build a replacement. The RPO should continue to pursue Road Safety Audit (RSAs) funding, Local Road Safety Initiative (LRSI) projects, focused expedited project delivery projects, and State Industrial Access (SIA) road grants.

Presentation of Projects to be Prioritized by the RPO

OCT Manager, Stacy Morrison, and Region 2 Project Development Manager, Robert Rogers, discussed the list of 7 projects to be prioritized by the RPO, which were further broken down into phases with

there being 12 listings to prioritize for different phases of development. Mr. Morrison went over the handouts and maps that were included in the members packets, highlighting specifics of each project, phase, cost, AADT, and crash rates. Mr. Morrison says projects across the state are mostly equally distributed among the RPOs, TPOs, and MPOs at about 10% per area. For the projects on the prioritization list, the phase shown is the next major phase to be funded.

Mr. Rogers said surveying work has begun on the projects in Marion (SR-2/U.S. 64/72) and Sequatchie (SR-28/Hwy 127). Sequatchie County Highway Superintendent, Eric Higgins, asked if was known how much right-of-way would need to be obtained along SR-28/Hwy 127, for which Mr. Rogers said it was not yet known at this time but the route would be improved to a super 2-lane road with turn lanes. The road would go to 12-foot lanes with 10-foot shoulders. There would not be any expected road realignments on this route.

A question was asked about how crash rates factored into the decision-making process. Mr. Morrison said the numbers could elevate a project based on the crash ratio. Region 2 Traffic Engineer, Alan Wolfe, said the crash ratio gives a better understanding of whether or not a route has a serious problem with crashes because just looking at the crash rate, while it may look high, could just be a concentrated area and may not indicate a design problem with the route.

Mr. Reese asked if the SR-40/US-64 Corridor K project being ranked for the preliminary engineering phase was for the bypass or spot improvements as discussed by Mr. Rogers. The ranking sheets and maps provided by TDOT listed this project to be ranked as the "(Ocoee River Gorge Bypass) Appalachia Corridor "K" west of Ocoee River to SR-68 in Ducktown". Mr. Rogers said this was not the bypass project as listed in the TDOT provided info, but was for spot safety improvements.

Voting for Prioritizing Regional Projects

Chad Reese reviewed the voting procedures established by the by-laws that would be used for prioritizing candidate projects for TDOT's FY 2021-2023 Three Year Program. Nine projects were listed for prioritization in the Right-of-Way and/or Construction category and three projects were listed in the study phase or Preliminary Engineering category. A list of the candidate projects is attached as a part of the minutes.

Focusing members attention to the sample ranking ballots, Mr. Reese reminded members that Technical Committee members would rank the projects first, followed by acceptance or denial by the RPO Executive Board. Seventeen technical committee members were present for the voting. The 2018 ranking was shown to the RPO members from the last time these projects were ranked on December 5, 2018. The ranking for each project would be tallied with the lowest overall score being the highest priority, the second lowest score being the second highest priority, and so forth.

McMinn County Mayor, John Gentry, asked if TDOT knew if there were projects that already had a committed funding stream, should we rank those lower on the list so as not to take away from projects that needed a boost to get moved up the list. Mr. Reese explained that all of the project on the list had committed funding from the IMPROVE Act passed by the state legislature, so all of the projects had funding commitments; it was still to be determined which would move forward first. Grundy County Mayor, Michael Brady, asked about projects that were requested for study last year by the RPO. Mr. Reese explained those projects would be placed on the backburner for now since TDOT was focusing on the IMRPOVE Act projects first. The projects mentioned by Mayor Brady would still be submitted as a

request for study from TDOT through the Community Transportation Planning Request (CTPR) process. SETHRA Deputy Director, Chris Kleehammer, asked if there was a recommendation on how to rank the SR-28/US-127 project that was now broken out into phases since the last time they voted. Mr. Rogers said the sections of this project with PIN #'s 124104.01 and 124104.05 were the furthest along. Sequatchie County Highway Superintendent, Eric Higgins, explained there were narrow bridges along this route on the Sequatchie end that needed to be addressed. OCT Planner, Andrea Noel, said there was a section on the scorecards for members to write in comments on issues specific to each project. Mayor Brady asked the purpose of ranking these projects as some projects have been on the list for years and never move and others do not make the list that have been requested. Mr. Morrison responded to Mayor Brady saying that prior to TDOT having the IMRPOVE Act in place, many RPOs voted on the same projects for 10 years. He said projects are moving across the state, but it can take anywhere from 3-5 years or more for each phase and could take anywhere from 12-15 years to get a project completed. Marion County Mayor, David Jackson, said they started the SR-2/US-62/72 project in the Spring 2007, and it was voted the #1 project. He said that project was shown to be a fully funded project years ago in the project status reports. Mayor Jackson said back then the project was shown to cost about \$27 million but never moved forward, and now it costs that much just to purchase the rightof-way with the total project costing more than \$60 million. He asked why we would continue ranking projects if they are considered to be fully funded. Mr. Morrison said the project had moved up from a prior phase, but had been slow to move forward.

Technical Committee members were given a score card, and it was required to have the member's name written on it and the ballot signed in order for the ranking to be counted. Members must be present or a proxy form must have already been submitted prior to voting for a vote to count. As per the bylaws, an individual may not hold more than one proxy; and therefore, can only vote in absence of one individual. Once the Technical Committee members have scored the projects, a final tally of the scores will by presented back to the Technical Committee for a roll call vote. In the event of a tie, the Technical Committee will vote on the tied projects by a roll call vote to determine which takes precedence over the other. The final ranking for the projects is based on a total sum of all the points awarded by each member of the Technical Committee and will be sent to the Executive Committee for discussion and adoption. The final prioritized list will then be submitted to TDOT for their consideration by the end of 2019.

After reviewing the prioritization process, the scorecards were passed out to the Technical Committee members, and were then collected after each member had the opportunity to complete them.

Federal Functional Classifications Update

OCT Planner, Andrea Noel, gave an overview of functional classifications, which was first introduced by the Federal Aid Act in 1921. The Federal Aid Highway Act of 1956 established a highway trust fund, and then the Federal Aid Highway Act of 1973 mandated a standardized functional classification system as a way to prioritize and track transportation needs based on an equitable system. The Federal Aid Highway Program (FAHP) funds are appropriated to each state to be implemented under 5 core programs: 1. National Highway Performance Program (NHP), 2. Surface Transportation Block Grant program (STBG), 3. Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), 4. Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement Program (CMAQ), and 5. the National Highway Freight Program (NHFP). Federal Functional Classification is the system by which roads are grouped into functional systems according to the type of service and amount of traffic the facility carries. It is a measure of traffic flow (speed & level of service) and a measure of the system's ability to provide access to and between land uses. This classification

system is also used to determine road design standards and if a road is eligible for federal aid funding. Changes to the functional classification system occur when federal policies change, at the conclusion of the decennial Census, when building or improving roadways, and when significant changes to a route have occurred over time. FHWA no longer considers urban boundaries a logical break, so functionally classified roads will now extend beyond these boundaries to include more of the same route. Following this new guidance, TDOT has identified 130 proposed changes to functionally classified routes in Region 2. Letters notifying local governments of the proposed changes will be sent out requesting comments.

Local Data Integration Program

TDOT Planning Specialist, Scott Pouder, gave a presentation on the 2019 Local Data Integration Program (LDIP). TDOT is wanting to start PILOT programs in several counties to collect and share roadway data on local roads to build a state-wide network on one online platform (likely ESRI online). They want to focus on working with distressed counties first. Options for collecting the data would be an online portal for submitting updates and changes to road inventory, utilizing Open Streets Map to make local network updates, providing access to Collector for ArcGIS to allow local data to be collected by highway departments, and creating a web map that is managed by TDOT but gives locals the ability to edit the network directly. Mr. Pouder encouraged anyone interested in being a part of one of the PILOT programs to contact him.

Technical Committee Chairman, Dan Evans, called on Chad Reese to report tallying of the scorecards for candidate projects. Ranking and total scores for the projects were as follows:

Mr. Reese said there were 17 voting Technical Committee members present who voted, and then proceeded to go over the results of the voting. Technical Committee Chairman, Dan Evans, called for a

motion to accept the project rankings by the Technical Committee. Beth Jones made a motion to accept the ranking of projects, which was seconded by Gregg Ridley. By roll call vote, the motion carried unanimously.

Executive Board Affirmation of Technical Committee Ranking

Executive Board Chairman, Bill James, then called for acceptance of the ranking by the Technical Committee. Sequatchie County Executive, Keith Cartwright made a motion to accept the rankings by the Technical Committee, which was seconded by McMinn County Mayor, John Gentry. By roll call vote, the motion carried unanimously.

SE TN Project Status Updates

Beth Jones asked for an update on the State Industrial Access Road into Nokian Tyres. Project Development Manager, Jeremy Sims, said they had reached an agreement with the railroad. The next step was to acquire property rights to be able to cross the property. Bledsoe Highway Superintendent, Robby Roberson, asked about the status of the SIA road for Summer City Road. Mr. Sims said they had received the application but did not have any further details on the project's status. McMinn County Highway Superintendent, Dan Evans, asked if the resurfacing and paving list was online, and was told it is available on TDOT's website. Mr. Evans also asked if Hwy 39 was on the list along with Hwy 11 for resurfacing. He said there were places these routes in bad shape. State Representative, Mark Cochran, asked who sets speed limits on state routes inside of city limits. He specifically asked about Hwy 411 through Englewood stating the speed limit was lowered when the road was widened to 4 lanes. Region 2 Traffic Engineer, Alan Wolfe, stated the speed limits are based on the design of the roadways, and when curb and gutters are added it often slows the maximum speed for safety reasons. Mr. Wolfe also said that cities had the ability to set limits on state routes within their jurisdiction, but not counties.

Mr. Reese closed out the discussion by announcing that applications for Community Transportation Planning Grants were being accepted through January 24, 2020. Requests can be made up to \$125,000 with a 10% match. Mr. Reese then thanked the highway officials for helping with TACIR surveys.

Other Business

There was no other business presented. On a motion from Marion County Mayor, David Jackson, Executive Board, and a second from Pikeville Mayor, Winkie Cagle, Executive Board, the joint meeting was adjourned. TDOT was thanked for allowing the RPO to use their meeting space and everyone was asked to join for lunch furnished by Bones Smokehouse.


